Christmas, the Cross & the Royal Martyr

"And this will be a sign for you: you will find a babe wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger."



In St John's Gospel we are told that if all the things that Jesus said or did were written, there would not be enough books in the world to contain the stories. Therefore, whatever words the evangelists use, we assume they were chosen for a reason and that nothing is superfluous. St Luke tells us no less than three times that Our Lord Jesus Christ was laid in a *manger*. Contemplation on this early throne for Our King led to the connection between the wood of the crib and the wood of the cross. It's an important connection to make as we remember that Jesus Christ was born so that he might die for the sins of the world. The gift of Christ wasn't simply a birth; the story

does not end here. The gift of Christ is the cross.

As we conclude the holy season of Advent and prepare to meet Jesus Christ in the manger, may we also contemplate the wood of his Cross. In doing so, may we remember his companions who followed him in death. Immediately after the Nativity,

we remember St Stephen, St John, and the Holy Innocents. The church calls us to think on how our birth in Jesus Christ comes from our death to sin.

While Charles I is certainly not Jesus Christ, we commemorate the events in his life because they are waypoints toward his martyrdom. His birth, his baptism, and his coronation are significant in that they establish the man who would ultimately offer his life for the sake of Christ and his Church. His earthly crown was exchanged for a heavenly one. Charles gave his life for Christ and gave us the gift of his holy example and even now, his intercession in heaven.

I pray that as we kneel before the manger of Christ, we will keep in mind the hard wood of the cross on which was hung the world's salvation and how we are all called to bear, with the Lord's help, the burden of our own cross. May St Charles, King and Martyr inspire us to be a gift to those who suffer in body, bind, or spirit by our presence and intercession here on earth.
